

## AUSTRALIAN CASUALTIES.

### 159th LIST ISSUED.

The 159th list of casualties and disabilities sustained by Australians on active service was issued by the Defence department last night. It contains 700 names, of which 379 represent new casualties. The deaths number 5, and 35 men are reported missing. There are 327 fresh cases of illness, and 9 men are reported injured. In the following list the battle casualties of all States are recorded, and, in addition, the names are given of Victorians reported seriously or dangerously ill, and returned to duty:—
